Over the centuries, the castle was expanded and renovated by various ruling powers, including the Byzantines, Normans, and Aragonese. Its current name derives from the noble Ruffo family of Calabria, who became its owners in the 15th century, transforming it into a fortified residence.

Used both as a defensive stronghold and a noble dwelling, the castle has preserved its symbolic and strategic role over time, still dominating the landscape of Scilla today with its imposing walls and millennia-old history.

Completing the experience in Chianalea di Scilla is its cuisine, an authentic expression of the sea and Calabrian tradition. Among waterfront restaurants and cozy trattorias tucked into the alleys, visitors can enjoy specialties such as grilled swordfish, pasta with the catch of the day, and rich flavors that reflect the territory. Each dish becomes a journey through the aromas of the Strait of Messina, leaving visitors with the memory of a place where beauty and taste meet in perfect harmony.

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
